- 5 years after becoming inactive
- By departments
- For primary value (administrative)

Second Review

- 25 Years after creation
- By departments + TNA
- For secondary value (historical and evidential)

Review of Grigg in 2004

It is possible to move forward for records in all formats through a process

value, but utilises some of the insights of functional appraisal to develop

which does not abandon proven systems or broad measures of archival

Functional macro-appraisal was considered:

	Cautions	Advantages
	Loss of provenance	Provides for electronic records
	Unproven	Analytical approach finds records of highest value
	Large volume already handled by Grigg system	Likely to identify runs of files of historical importance
)	Focus on departmental activities/functions neglects social duty	Practical for small discrete agencies
	Difficult to apply to case files	Good for hybrid records

Local Authority Archives

Policies and practice vary across Record Offices

Although most have appraisal policies, archivists tend to rely on 'experience and intuition' in practice.² Case Study: Surrey History Centre



- Macro-appraisal at series level
- Liaison with Records Management and depositors
- File and piece level appraisal where macro-appraisal not practicable
- Selective, structured and random sampling where appropriate
- In line with legislation, in-house + TNA guidelines³



Practice

- Emphasis on in-house policy
- Selection favours retention over disposition
- Limited by resources (especially for electronic and AV records)
